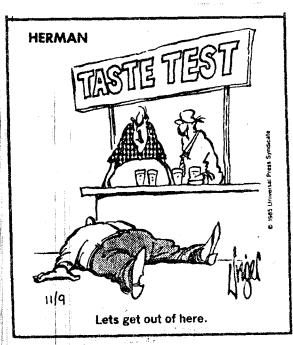
EDITORS CORNER

RESERVIST OF THE MONTH FOR FEBRUARY

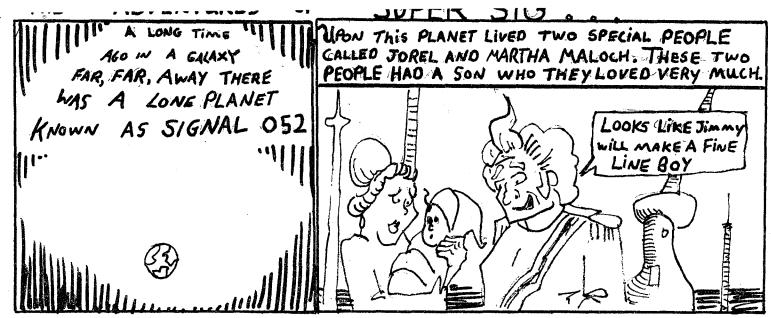

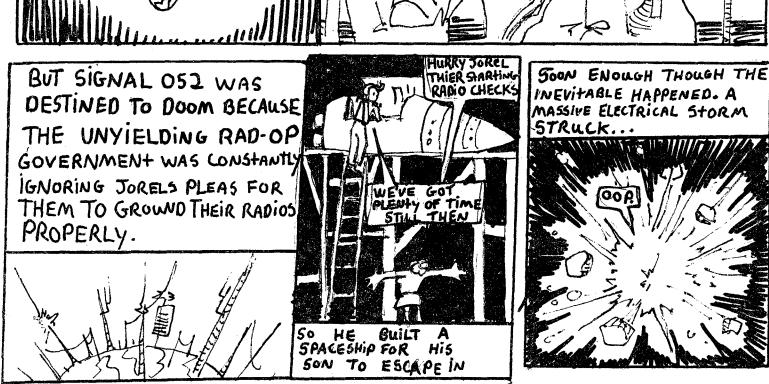
Coming a super close second is Mcpl Ken Milling for achieving two consecutive shut-outs in floor hockey. Good work Ken.

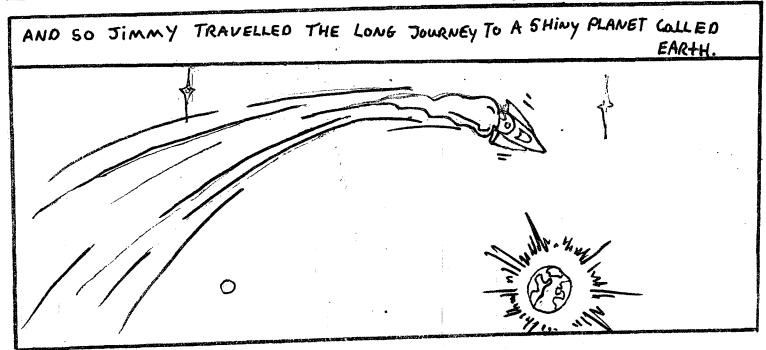
Though he isn't a reservist, I think Cpl Dan Mayo should get special mention. What would a day be without seeing his bright smiling face to greet you in the OR?

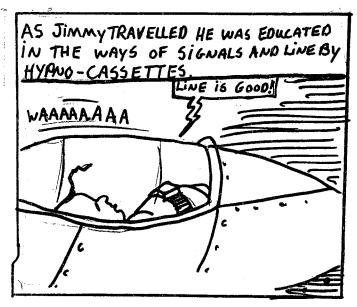
REMINDERS

- 3. Don't forget to pay your mess dues (JRs), they're only \$20.00 for the year.

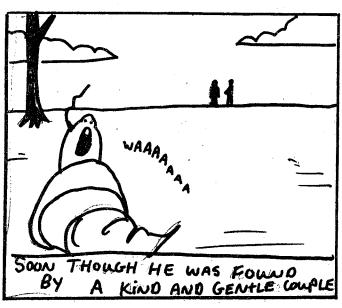




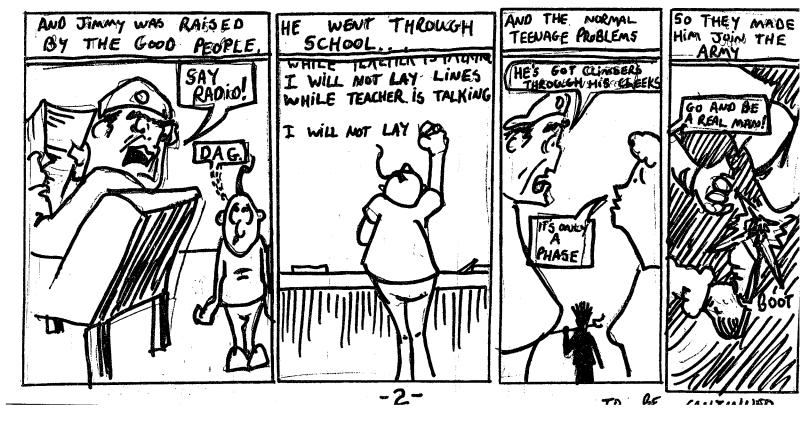
