What is Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI)? These terms are interpreted vastly different depending on a person's origin, cultural heritage, gender, age, education and experience.

Views on collective belonging, its significance, and its influence on the organization can vary greatly. From a militarized perspective, individuals are encouraged to have a socially and organizationally conservative mindset. In the past, members were trained to not question their position, authority, or acknowledge feelings. We have seen recent changes within the CAF. One such change being within our dress and deportment. Many have felt this positive impact firsthand, from junior to senior ranks, reinforcing the engagement of individuality and cultural belonging. Inclusion impacts everyone and encourages a space where all voices and experiences are relevant and seen as important. It is important to acknowledge that the lack of diversity within our ranks is significant, and we continue to face considerable gender and cultural imbalances. Among all of this, there are also inherent collective challenges that we all face day-to-day that fall within the scope of EDI.

With that said, some still feel uncertain about what EDI means and what affect it can have on their life. So, what does EDI mean to 77 Line Regiment and our membership? Do you see or experience bullying? Do you feel like you have good ideas that are never considered? Do you have a say in social activities that excite you? Is your career being managed properly? Do you see a future in the forces? The CO's and RSM's main discourse for supporting the Regimental Support Committee (RSC), is having a collective voice that can help make positive horizontal and bottom-up changes. It is important we all work together as one and not negate the chain of command, but support improvements upon it. It is critical to acknowledge that although the CO and RSM support effective change, there is only so much that can be done at a L4 Regimental level.

The RSC, formally the Soldiers Committee, was established to build upon and expand the efforts of the original Inclusivity Committee. This has a renewed focus on collaboration and support within the Regiment. The aim is to address issues internal to the Regiment and provide mechanisms to address issues of importance in the EDI space. The committee took a hiatus until April of this year to obtain education and restructure itself. Since doing so, it has cultivated a voice amongst leadership at senior-level meetings. It has established a constitution to protect membership in the future pursuits of RSC activities. It has achieved open dialogue with Chief Professional Conduct and Culture (CPCC) and national coaches to advise on and support questions and concerns. The RSC also has a designation from Rotman School of Business on proper foundational efficacy for establishing effective EDI committees and programs. Utilizing formally collected data by the Inclusivity Committee, RSC has created proof-of-concept graphic user interface for the Land Acknowledgement initiative, hopefully to be implemented for use soon.

The formation of the RSC marks a significant step forward for our Regiment. Unlike simply rebranding the previous Inclusivity Committee, this reimagined committee was created with a distinct purpose. We are committed to building on the valuable lessons learned from previous efforts while introducing fresh, actionable goals that resonate with the current needs and values of our Regiment. Our focus is on collaboration, support, and making meaningful progress that benefits everyone in our Regiment.

The CO signed RSC Constitution, which allows for 31 people of 77 Line Regiment of all ranks and employment affiliation to have voting seats amongst RSC membership. Additional squadron representatives may be considered based on how dispersed members may be from its HQ location. Soon, the RSC will be introducing themselves by way of squadron level briefs. Using a bottom-up strategy over the next two quarters, each session will be separated by junior, seniors ranks, and civilians. The RSC will take the time to listen to the voices of squadron members, and discuss concerns and ideas for positive change. This will be an opportunity for squadron members to express their interest in joining the committee, if they so wish to.

La culture est une facette de tout environnement de travail, elle reflète et façonne à la fois la façon dont nous atteignons nos objectifs, participons aux opérations et interagissons les uns avec les autres. La culture change aussi avec nous.



Le comité de soutien régimentaire représente la volonté des membres de l'unité de mettre en œuvre un changement de culture au sein du régiment. La Récente Constitution nous permet d'avoir au maximum 31 personnes de toutes affiliations professionnelles ou rangs de siéger parmi les membres votants du comité. Depuis sont instauration, l'association compte désormais une dizaine de membres réguliers. Le groupe prendra le temps de se présenter à nouveau, d'écouter les voix de ses membres et de discuter de préoccupations et d'idées à fins d'accomplir des changements positifs. Si vous êtes intéressée à participer au comité de support du régiment faite le savoir à votre chaine de commande. Au plaisir de se voir accomplir des changements durable et positif.

Although true transparency is vital for effective organizational change, considerations for individuals and delicate matters must be upheld regarding privacy and decorum. A plus box has been created +77L Regt Support Committee | +77L Regimental Support Committer@77 Line Regt@Kingston. Only the RSC Chair, Co-Chair and Senior Advisor have access. For any enquires, comments, questions and concerns someone will always be there to address you personally.

The RSC has ambitious goals to support the belonging of everyone within 77 Line Regiment, but this can only be achieved with equitable squadron inclusion of the diverse voices it represents.

There appears to be no slowing down for us here at RHQ. Two sixmonth tour deployments in early spring timeframe in support of Op REASSURANCE and Op IMPACT, sending members from various squadrons within 77 Line Regiment on their way. Technical Assistance Visits (TAVs) support requests were also added to the mix, including one requesting additional support within Camp Adazi, and another with 1LS deploying with CFJSR. A composite crew composed of 4LS and 1LS members deployed to the Middle East, supporting Op PROTEUS to complete cable plant upgrades. Canada's Western provinces and territories have witnessed a significant uptick in activity, despite the moratorium on significant tower maintenance, since the last Cable articles were written. In the last 8 months, 3 Line pers have participated in Op LENTUS, Op REASSURANCE, and Op IMPACT, supported 1 Line tasks, and operated within 5 Line Sqns' AoR.

Our HQ has undergone quite a transformation, with the departure of the 2IC, the SSM, both regional WOs, and the Senior HRA. Capt

Hocquard came to us from 3 Cdn Div HQ, replacing Capt Chmil. MWO Poole has also left us, making room for the promotion and appointment of MWO Langevin. Her appointment made room for the promotion and posting of WO Nistor to the Ops WO position. MWO Young was promoted and posted to the LCS position at CFJSR and WO Hardy is off to the language school. WO Davenport was promoted in Winnipeg and joined the 3 LS HQ in late August. Lastly, MCpl Roper, our Senior Human Resource Administrator (Senior HRA) has decided to retire from service.

The year got off to a slow start with the cancellation of the western antenna swing, but then things really got moving in short order. On extremely short notice 3 Line's Regional Line Work Center assembled a composite crew from some of the base Dets to travel to Shearwater in support of 5 Line's emergency decommissioning of towers at Hartlen Point...Timber! Since then, the squadron dealt with a shattered Johnny Ball on one of the 89J high frequency towers in Edmonton, repaired the antennas for 1RCHA's 5G FCS trials in Shilo, and spent eight weeks in Comox conducting a detailed audit of the entire Outside Cable Plant. While not on the road, efforts are ongoing to ensure continued regulation of emission security. The Regional Crew had a chance to catch its breath on some well-deserved leave, but immediately redeployed to Comox to finish their audit. While the troops were on leave, the WO and the stores person assembled and shipped a large amount of tools to support another emergency repair task way up north at the Arctic Training Center.

Following the writing of this article, the squadron will all participate in Ex TREE LINE, where, in addition to the Sqns IBTS, the RLWC will be the Sqn SMEs for the Sqn Pole Line refresher. This, on top of executing as much of Wainwright's Aerial maintenance as possible, and an installation of the new AGA at Airfield 1.



Sgt McFarlane-Hurst deployed to Op IMPACT as the LCF in May, to be followed shortly by another one of our members, who will be replacing him in November. The arrival of MCpl Pearson has laid the foundations for a second crew, but the impact felt from the departure of Cpl Smith (going to be a doctor), Cpl O'Halloran, Cpl Lidstone and Cpl Bui will be significant. Cpl Kuzyk and, eventually Cpl Poole, are not going to be alone in the daily routine, as Cpl Hedstrom in returning to the squadron. Unfortunately, WO Stoneham will be leaving us in October, preparing for the next leg in his journey, and will be deeply missed.

6 Classified Infrastructure

It's been a busy year for 6 Classified Infrastructure (CI) Squadron. The Red Installation Technical Authority (RITA) has been busy, starting new projects even as old ones close. Crypto and Shields (C&S) section have been busy churning out hundreds of cryptographic devices, while Installations and Modifications (I&M) section having been travelling all over Canada and beyond. It has also been a year with a lot of movement as people get promoted, posted out and posted in. Despite the operational tempo, we still manage to find time to have some fun.



There are currently eight personnel in the RITA section, with four designer positions still unfilled. These personnel are extremely busy with a wide range of tasks and mandates working out of Ottawa and Kingston. It is here in this section that projects and directives for I&M are generated. Before I&M section arrives on the ground, RITA personnel will have already visited the site and met with the local OPI, reviewed RFC(s) to ensure accuracy and client unit needs, and how best to design and implement changes to achieve the desired result. Project directives are not just limited to Red Distribution Systems (RDS) and fibre, they also involve the fabrication of shielded twisted pair, and different shielded serial cables for use with Cryptographic equipment, which I&M will fabricate. Mr. Dave Burnett performs EMSEC inspections for buildings and base infrastructure. He also writes directives for shield testing that go on to C&S to be implemented.

Mr. Dan Hood is the Technical Authority (TA) for RDS and Shielded Enclosures. RITA engages in all capital projects (building contracts). To do this, they must consult with contractors and project managers. They perform inspections to ensure compliance with regulations. At the time of this interview, one of the planners (Mr. Steve Jones) had 18 projects in development with an additional seven capital projects. Finally, the section is responsible for maintaining records of all primary drawings of RDS and associated cable records. A lot of work for an understaffed section that punches well above its weight.

Those who know of 6 CI squadron often think of the I&M section. This is because they are so busy travelling around the country and beyond, performing their important work on Classified Infrastructure. So far this year, I&M have had multiple projects from Halifax, Greenwood, Kingston, and Petawawa, to Shirley's Bay, Latvia, and Wiesbaden (Germany). The work is far from over for them, however. There are additional projects planned for multiple locations across Canada, the United States, and around the world. With twelve members stationed in Kingston and another four in the Ottawa DET, it's not surprising that we rarely see them around the unit with the workload they must do. While the work that C&S section does is perhaps not as glamourous, they have been no less busy. So far this year, they have performed 803 acceptance checks on cryptographic equipment, representing over 1,200 hours of work for the section. They have also destroyed/demilitarized (deliberately—according to their cradle to grave mandate) over 450 cryptographic devices, taking over 80 hours of labour. Although C&S spends a lot of time underground, they have performed inspections on five shielded enclosures across Canada and the United States. Each shield represents a little over a hundred hours of work.

All this work is being performed by three civilians, three Corporals and three Master Corporals prior to the APS, with a little help from I&M section of course. Special thanks should go to MCpl Ginanian from the I&M section for assisting with throughput in C&S, when not travelling across the world.

Things are looking up for the C&S section. Sgt Primeau has been posted in, filling the foreman/ 2IC position, left vacant for too long. The section has also gained two new Aviators, diligently completing their OJT package. Avr Gatbonton and Avr Roberts are in Trenton right now, completing the airfield portion of their OJT package. When their training is done and their security clearances are approved, they will join the other technicians in C&S, grinding out material for use by the DND.
